

# Analysis of CNBC's America's Top States for Business 2024

## **Summary**

Virginia placed 1<sup>st</sup> in CNBC's *America's Top States for Business 2024*, released today. This is the sixth time CNBC has named Virginia the Top State for Business, the most of any state since CNBC inaugurated the rankings in 2007. This is also Virginia's third win in the past five years, following first place results in 2019 and 2021.

Each year, CNBC awards points to each state based on their rankings in ten broad categories ranging from workforce and education to the cost of doing business and the cost of living. While these categories are generally constant from year to year, the individual metrics within each category and the overall weight of each category are adjusted each year to reflect the latest trends and issues in business. This year, for the first time in the history of the rankings, CNBC gave the most weight, 17% of overall score, to the infrastructure category. The categories in Figure 1 below are listed in descending order of weight, with cost of living comprising just 2% of a state's overall score.

This year saw the closest difference yet recorded between the first and second place states in the rankings—Virginia won a total of 1595 points, out of a maximum of 2,500, to claim the top position, followed by North Carolina with 1592 points. Virginia and North Carolina have traded positions in the *America's Top State for Business* rankings in recent years—Virginia placed 2<sup>nd</sup> overall to North Carolina in 2023, and 3<sup>rd</sup> overall to North Carolina and Washington, respectively, in 2022. In 2024, Texas, Georgia, and Florida round out the top five.

Virginia's recognition as the Top State for Business was bolstered by a strong performance in each of the ten categories—Virginia finished in the top half of every category, including ranking 1<sup>st</sup> in Education, 3<sup>rd</sup> in Infrastructure, and 5<sup>th</sup> in Business Friendliness.

The following sections detail Virginia's performance in each of the ten categories. Two visualizations follow these sections. The first visualization shows Virginia's performance overall and in each of the ten categories from 2016 to present. The second compares Virginia's overall rank in these years to the Commonwealth's neighboring and competitor states.

#### Infrastructure

Virginia received 273 of 425 possible points in the Infrastructure category. Metrics used include the value and volume of goods shipped by air, water, road, and rail; the condition of highways and bridges; the availability of air travel; commute time; the quality, availability, and price of broadband service; access to markets as measured by population living within 500 miles of each state; the availability of vacant land, office, and industrial space; the condition of drinking water and wastewater systems; the reliability of the electrical grid; the availability of renewable energy; and the sustainability of overall infrastructure, based on the risk of flooding, wildfires, and extreme weather. Finally, for the first time in 2024, this category also measures state site readiness programs in terms of overall funding and number of certified sites.

Virginia ranked 3<sup>rd</sup> in Infrastructure this year, furthering the Commonwealth's rapid improvement on this metric in recent years—in 2016, Virginia ranked 32<sup>nd</sup> overall in the category, steadily rising to a 9<sup>th</sup> place finish in 2022 and 10<sup>th</sup> in 2023. Georgia ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in Infrastructure among all states, successfully defending its 1<sup>st</sup> place finish in the category last year.

The Virginia Business Ready Sites Program and related initiatives played a major role in the Commonwealth's high rank in the Infrastructure category, highlighting the ongoing importance of such programs to our overall business climate. As other states, including Georgia, continue to provide funding for their site readiness programs, it remains critical that Virginia do the same.

#### Workforce

Virginia received 232 of 375 possible points in the Workforce category. Metrics used include concentration of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) workers; the percentage of workers with college degrees, associate degrees, and industry-recognized credentials; the net migration of educated workers to the state; state worker training programs; right to work laws; and worker productivity based on economic output per job.

Virginia ranked 9<sup>th</sup> in Workforce this year, down from 7<sup>th</sup> in 2023. Prior to 2022, Virginia ranked in the top three in Workforce each year since 2016, claiming the top position once in 2019. Texas ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in Workforce this year, up from 2<sup>nd</sup> in 2023.

# **Economy**

Virginia received 227 of 350 possible points in the Economy category. Metrics used included gross domestic product (GDP) growth and job growth over the past year; the overall fiscal condition based on credit ratings and outlook; the health of the residential real estate market based on factors including inventory, price appreciation, among others; the number of major corporations headquartered in the state; and new business formations. Finally, new in 2024, this category also measures foreign direct investment (FDI) in absolute terms and as a percentage of state GDP.

Virginia ranked 11<sup>th</sup> in Economy this year, up from 13<sup>th</sup> in 2023. As with Infrastructure, Virginia has steadily climbed the Economy rankings since 2016 when the Commonwealth ranked 30<sup>th</sup>. Florida ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in Economy this year, successfully defending its 1<sup>st</sup> place finish in the category last year.

## **Quality of Life**

Virginia received 189 of 325 possible points in the Quality of Life category. Metrics used include per capita crime rates; environmental quality; health care; worker protections; the strength of state laws protecting against discrimination; voting rights and secure election systems; the availability and affordability of qualified childcare facilities; and state laws on abortion.

Virginia ranked 19<sup>th</sup> in Quality of Life this year, down from 16<sup>th</sup> in 2023. The Commonwealth's position has held relatively steady in this category since 2016, ranging from 19<sup>th</sup> (in 2018 also) to 11<sup>th</sup> in 2021. Vermont ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in Quality of Life again this year, having claimed the top position in this category each year since 2021.

## **Cost of Doing Business**

Virginia received 160 of 275 possible points in the Cost of Doing Business category. Metrics used include ranking each state's tax burden and strength of its overall business tax climate; the cost of wages and utilities; the cost of office and industrial space; incentives and tax breaks offered to reduce business costs; and incentives for development of disadvantaged communities. Finally, new in 2024, this category also measures increases in commercial property and casualty insurance premiums.

Virginia ranked 24<sup>th</sup> in Cost of Doing Business this year, up from 34<sup>th</sup> in the category in 2023. Virginia's ranking in this category has also improved dramatically since 2016 when the Commonwealth ranked 36<sup>th</sup>. This year's result appears to mark the first time Virginia has placed in the top half of all states in the category. Oklahoma ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in Cost of Doing Business this year, up from 3<sup>rd</sup> in 2023.

## **Technology & Innovation**

Virginia received 167 of 250 possible points in the Technology & Innovation category. Metrics used include the number of patents issued per capita; health, science, and agriculture research

grants; and domestic semiconductor research, development, and manufacturing. Finally, new in 2024, this category also measures each state's role in the development of artificial intelligence (AI) and the availability of AI jobs, as well as state success securing a "Tech Hub" designation from the federal government through the CHIPS and Science Act.

Virginia ranked 15<sup>th</sup> in Technology & Innovation this year, unchanged from 2023. Virginia's position in this category has held relatively constant since 2016, when Virginia also ranked 15<sup>th</sup>. Since 2016, Virginia has not ranked lower than 17<sup>th</sup> in Technology & Innovation. Texas and New York were tied for 1<sup>st</sup> in the category this year; last year, Massachusetts and California tied for 1<sup>st</sup> in the category.

## **Business Friendliness**

Virginia received 170 of 250 possible points in the Business Friendliness category. Metrics used include lawsuit and liability climates; regulatory regimes covering areas including trade and labor; overall bureaucracy; and hospitality to emerging industries. Finally, new in 2024, this metric also considers state regulations guiding AI industry development, as well as state land use regulations.

Virginia ranked 5<sup>th</sup> in Business Friendliness this year, up from 6<sup>th</sup> in both 2022 and 2023. CNBC has consistently ranked Virginia one of the most business friendly states since 2016, when the Commonwealth ranked 3<sup>rd</sup> in the category. North Dakota ranked 1<sup>st</sup> once again in Business Friendliness this year, having claimed the top position in this category in 2022 and 2023.

## **Education**

Virginia received 91 of 125 possible points in the Education category. Metrics used include K-12 test scores, class sizes, and spending; the number of colleges and universities; long-term trends in state support for higher education; the number and presence of historically Black colleges and universities (HBCUs); and the strength of each state's community college and career education systems.

Virginia ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in Education this year, successfully defending its 1<sup>st</sup> place finish in the category in 2023. Since 2016, Education has consistently been the Commonwealth's topperforming category. Indeed, Virginia has ranked 1<sup>st</sup> or 2<sup>nd</sup> in the category each year since 2019. Massachusetts, the only state to outrank Virginia in Education since 2019, placed second this year.

## **Access to Capital**

Virginia received 58 of 75 possible points in the Access to Capital category. Metrics used include venture capital investments in each state; traditional bank lending both absolute and relative to other states; and state-backed capital assistance and loan guarantee programs.

Virginia ranked 8<sup>th</sup> in Access to Capital this year, down from 4<sup>th</sup> in 2023. Despite the slip in rankings this year, Virginia has also steadily improved its ranking in this category since 2016 when the Commonwealth ranked 15<sup>th</sup>. California again claimed 1<sup>st</sup> place in Access to Capital—California has ranked 1<sup>st</sup> in this category each year since 2017.

## **Cost of Living**

Virginia received 28 of 50 possible points in the Cost of Living category. The single metric for this category is an index of costs for basic items by state; in addition to goods, this index also includes housing affordability and, for the first time in 2024, the cost to insure a median priced home.

Virginia ranked 19<sup>th</sup> overall in Cost of Living this year, up from 25<sup>th</sup> in the category in 2023. Similar to Infrastructure and Cost of Doing Business, Virginia has made great progress in Cost of Living since 2016, when the Commonwealth ranked 30<sup>th</sup> overall. Virginia's improvement in this category was critical to securing the overall 1<sup>st</sup> place result, particularly as Virginia outperformed North Carolina (31<sup>st</sup> in Cost of Living) for the first time ever. West Virginia ranked 1<sup>st</sup> for Cost of Living in 2024, up from 5<sup>th</sup> in 2023.
